2022 Open House A Tremendous Hit

This year's Open House, held March 26 through April 2, had over 2,000 attendees. Our average presentation had 89 people attending and our largest, Eric Vaughn's "The Hidden Treasures Utilizing Newspapers," had 170 attendees. There were people attending from across the United States, Canada, Ireland, Scotland, and Australia.

The Open House generated 26 new members, many membership renewals, and 27 people signed up for this newsletter.

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

How to Get Research Help at FamilySearch

FamilySearch.org is designed to help people worldwide discover their family's history through its website and mobile apps. Many researchers are aware that FamilySearch provides billions of online records and indexes but are not aware of their complementary research help. By registering for an account, users may access these free, non-obligatory resources. Follow the links below to use these resources, which will enhance, guide, and break through the brick walls found in every family tree.

FAMILYSEARCH COMMUNITY

The FamilySearch Community site connects people who are researching in the same region. This is the place to get collaborative help for specific research questions or upload documents for translation. The Community also provides links to important websites for research in specific geographical areas and posts significant events such as upcoming seminars and conferences.

To join a group, ask questions, or post documents:

- On the FamilySearch Community home page, sign in by using your FamilySearch username and password.
- 2. Underneath the welcome banner at the top of the page are three tiles labeled FamilySearch Help, Research Help, and Groups. Select Groups. This is the fastest and most effective way to get help. Area specific queries posted in Research Help will be redirected to a group.
- 3. The "Groups" page has two search bars. Do not use the main search bar at the top of the page. To search for a group to join, use the SEARCH GROUPS bar, which is located in the white space below the page header. Enter the name of the region or country of interest (e.g., Germany). A group name with an icon, such as a flag or map, will appear. Select the group you would like to join, such as "German Genealogy Research."

- 4. If a group does not match the region or country you searched for, you may wish to browse the available groups. Do this from the "Groups" page by selecting the RESEARCH GROUPS tab at the top of the white space below the header. Scroll down to see if your region or country of interest may be included in one of the available groups.
- After clicking on a group to join, you will find the title of the group at the top of the page. Many groups will also give a brief description of what they cover and the names of the group administrators.
- 6. To join the group, scroll down the page until you see the white Join button located just above the announcements. The button turns blue when you hover over it. If you do not see the white/blue button, make sure you are logged in. You must be logged in to join a group, and you must join a group to be able to post a question.
- 7. To post a question or document, scroll down to the "Discussions" section and click on the New Discussion button on the left side of the page. To ask for a translation, post the URL to the document in the discussion box. The URL makes translation easier for the translator, but you may post a document if a URL is not available.

VIRTUAL GENEALOGY CONSULTATIONS

Get individual guidance and next step help by scheduling a virtual genealogy consultation with a research specialist. Each 20-minute session is held via Zoom and is a great opportunity for your family history questions to be answered by professional researchers at the Family History Library in Salt Lake City, Utah. Strategize with people who have extensive research experience with specific countries and regions.

To sign up for a virtual genealogy consultation:

1. From the booking page, select an area of research by scrolling to choose the type of consultation you are interested in. Options include how to use the Famil-

ySearch website, understanding DNA research, or tracing your immigrant ancestors. If you wish to consult with a specialist for a specific country, select a global region and then choose the country from the list that generates. Click on the green arrow on the right of your desired category.

- 2. If you selected a global region, narrow your option by selecting immigration, Jewish, or specific country research help. Scroll down the page to see all options.
- 3. Select your time zone from the pop-up table. Click CONTINUE.
- 4. Select a day and time you would like to meet with a specialist.
- 5. Enter the requested information in the form that appears. Providing detailed information about your research question and ancestor will help the research specialist prepare for your interview.

The Learning Center is an online vault of recorded classes and webinars designed to educate researchers. Here, experts share insights, research strategies, and tips as they pertain to various regions or topics.

Search for courses of interest by entering a location, subject, or instructor name in the search bar located within the blue ribbon at the top of the page.

FAMILYSEARCH WIKI

The FamilySearch Wiki contains over 97,000 genealogical articles. Each country, state, and many sub-jurisdictions have their own portal page with links to educational articles, record collections at FamilySearch, as well as websites outside their domain. For example, to learn

about German research, type "Germany Genealogy" into the search box on the main wiki page. This will open the Germany portal page where links can be followed to learn about record types, German history, handwriting classes,

and more! This is the place for guidance on any aspect of German research.

From the Wiki home page, enter a location or topic in the search field, or click on an area of the map to bring up a selection table to select from a list.

FAMILY HISTORY LIBRARY RECORD LOOKUP SERVICE

The Family History Library offers a free record lookup service in fifteen different languages for guests who are unable to visit in person. Online patrons may request images of pages of books, films, or digitized records that are not available online. This is not a research service. All requests must include a title or call number for books or a film, fiche, or image group number for digital images. An email with PDF copies of the materials requested should arrive within approximately two weeks of each successful submission.

How to request a record lookup:

- 1. From the Family History Library Record Lookup Service page, scroll down to the ribbon at the bottom of the page that says Book/Film Remote Access Service Request and click on the green button that says Request Lookup.
- Fill out your contact information on the "Remote Access Services Request" form and click NEXT at the bottom of the page.
- 3. For film, fiche, or digital image requests, please be prepared to provide:
 - Film, fiche or DGS number
 - Image number
 - Name on document
 - Locality of record (e.g., Germany)
 - Date of the record
 - A link to the image index
 - Any additional details that may help locate the record
- 4. For book requests, please be prepared to provide:
 - Title and author
 - Call number
 - Information needed
 - Any additional details that may help locate the record



GFO's New Home Appeal Revitalized

The Genealogical Forum of Oregon Board launched our New Home Appeal a year ago in the May 2021 *Forum Insider*. After a brief hiatus, the New Home Committee is back at work under the direction of Geoff Smith. In April, members should have received a letter about the next stage of our campaign.

During the pandemic shutdown, the GFO continued library purchases and donation processing. Our holdings have increased by nearly 2,000 since the New Home Appeal began, and we don't anticipate a slowdown. To preserve resources for the future, the library requires more space.

Plus, we have been listening to you, our members! We know that you want a location with ample parking and larger classroom space. A permanent home would fulfill these desires while providing financial stability. Instead of facing steady rent increases in a costly city, our monthly payments would be an investment in GFO's future.

We need \$500,000—at the very least—for a down payment by late 2025. We have reached nearly 30% of this goal. Moving forward, the New Home Committee has established some enticing donor recognitions:

• \$1,250 will purchase the space for one of our 153 bookcases, and we will install a plaque with your name on the bookcase.

tificates, probate/estate paperwork, cemetery records, obituaries, and so on. In our personal lives, however, we may not be so enthusiastic. Lawson will show you how to plan for the inevitable, covering topics such as creating an "End of Life" book and ensuring your family knows where to find your last messages.

Lawson's research focuses in locating missing heirs, identifying unknown heirs, probate research, due diligence, and kinship determination. Her experience ranges from proving family lines to proving parentage for those unable to speak due to injury or disability (dementia, Alzheimer's, schizophrenia). A national and regional speaker, Leslie is a past board member of the Association of Professional Genealogists, a past President of the Council for the Advancement of Forensic Genealogists and immediate past president of the Oregon Chapter of the Association of Professional Genealogists.

The 1950 Census Is Here!

Help Make it Easily Searchable

On April 1, 2022, the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) released the 1950 United States Federal Census for computer indexing by *Ancestry*. You can review what the computers have done and help make the census fully searchable by name.

To help review the 1950 census go to either NARA or FamilySearch:

- 1. Click "Begin search."
- 2. Check the "Tips for searching the census," and then enter the search parameters.
- 3. When you have entered your information, potentially matching pages come up on the next page. Click the "Help Us Transcribe Names" button on the right to begin indexing.

- 1. Sign into your free FamilySearch account.
- 2. Click Start Now.
- 3. Choose an available state and click Get Started in the "Review Names" or "Review Families" field.

4. Enter a last name (optional) to begin reviewing names.




The first part of this book covers immigration policies that affected individuals coming from China, Japan, Korea, South Asia, and the Philippines. A discussion of common challenges, such as transliteration of Asian languages and calculating for differing calendar systems is included. In the second part, records specific to Asian Americans are covered. Explanations are given for the types of records that may be available both in the United States and in the country of origin. Keep in mind that some of the mentioned collections may be online today, especially those kept by the Family History Library. The GFO is a FamilySearch affiliate library so collections not available from home may be accessible at the library.

Chinese Immigration and Chinese in the United States: Records in the Regional Archives of the National Archives and Records Administration

This pamphlet acts as a finding aid for the record groups held by the National Archives that are specific to Chinese immigrants. It includes descriptions for records held at regional offices throughout the United States. Using the record titles, you can search the *online catalog at the National Archives* to see which record may have been digitized.

Genealogical lists printed in Hawaiian language newspapers between 1865 and 1920 have been transcribed in this second volume produced by Edith Kawelohea McKinzie. The lists appear in the original Hawaiian and include translation to English. This volume includes "some major kahuna or priestly lineages" (p. xiii).



Tutorial for County Coroner Records Online


Through a collaboration with the Multnomah County Archives, the tutorial for the digitized Multnomah County coroner records, written by *Insider* co-editor Keri Logan and originally published in the February 2022 *Forum Insider*, has been reproduced on the county archives web page. The tutorial can be accessed *here*.

Coroner's records do not include all deaths, but any death of an individual not under the care of a doctor may have been investigated. These may contain name, age and birthdate, address, place of birth, cause of death, verdict of



jury, burial notes, and more.

The Multnomah County Archives has digitized coroner records from 1 July 1894–11 June 1923, however the archives holds undigitized records to 1965. To access the later records, contact the archives at <u>records@multco.us</u> or 503-988-3741.

be "Using Land Records from State Land State: Part 1"-90% of adult, White males in this country before 1850 were landowners. Not many early records include such a large segment of the population, which makes them an invaluable resource for genealogists. Although you won't necessarily find all the information you want in one record, the records can provide information about family relationships, vital events, and family migration patterns. Always squeeze every bit of information out of them you can. We'll discuss where to find them, how to understand what we find, and some of the many ways to use them. We will also have some time to hear about any discoveries you may have found researching bounty land and answer any questions now that you've had time to digest the information. 

GFO RootsMagic SIG Starting in May

The GFO is thrilled to announce that a RootsMagic Special Interest Group will start meeting online in May. This SIG will be facilitated by Barry Wolff.

A native of New Jersey, Barry retired five years ago. His

37-year Engineering/Program Management career with The Boeing Company started in Seattle and ended in Philadelphia. He currently resides in Pennsylvania.

He always had an interest in knowing who his ancestors were, but it wasn't until retirement that he decided to do more than just talk about

them. Both his mother and his father's second cousin had done family research 25–35 years ago (prior to data being available online like it is today). There was one drawback, very little of this "headstart" information identified where/how they found the information. On his wife's side, he started from scratch. Thankfully, all four of their parents and his wife's 104-year-old grandmother are still with them and able to answer questions about their parents, grandparents, aunts, and uncles.

After evaluating the options available at the time, Barry selected RootsMagic as the software tool to document and manage his genealogy research. Over the past year, he began helping other users on the RootsMagic User Facebook Group and now, after recently joining the GFO, he has volunteered to lead the new RootsMagic GFO Interest Group.

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GFO Bids Farewell to DNA SIG Founder

After 17 years, Emily Aulicino, facilitator of the DNA Beginner's Special Interest Group (SIG), has retired. Emily founded the GFO DNA group around 2005. In the beginning, about 30 people met in a back room at the GFO's prior location on Gideon Street in Portland. The GFO now has three DNA SIGs with membership lists in the

hundreds. More than 100 attendees regularly attend online meetings.

Emily attributes the formation of the DNA SIG, as well as creating 11 DNA projects with Family Tree DNA and attending DNA conferences, for her many friendships and collaborations within the genetic genealogy community. Through her contacts, Emily brought noted speakers to the GFO group.

Emily met Colleen Fitzpatrick, internationally recognized forensic genealogist, in 2005 at a Family Tree DNA conference held in Washington DC at the National Geographic Society. When she invited Fitzpatrick to speak, the group had to move to the church across from the Woodstock Wine and Deli on Woodstock Boulevard to fit all the attendees.

Just after Barbara Rae-Venter was revealed as the forensic genetic genealogist who helped uncover the Golden State Killer, Emily—who had met Rae-Venter in Lon-

don at another FTDNA conference—asked her to speak at GFO Open House.

Emily also arranged for a local cold case detective to speak on a panel regarding law enforcement's use of DNA.

All that doesn't even touch on the countless presentations Emily has shared with the GFO community. She is an accomplished speaker in her own right who has traveled the world, giving presentations throughout the U.S., Canada, Ireland, the Republic of Ireland, England, and Germany.

As she moves into this next phase, Emily will write about her ancestors, Evan Ogan and Susan Wycle. They are not her oldest Ogan line, but she feels they deserve special honor because Susan bore and raised 18 children in the first half of the 1800s, with all the children living to adulthood and having at least one child. She has also promised to work on a cookbook with her granddaughter. And she is looking forward to spending more time with family and friends and traveling again to visit friends across the U.S.

The GFO is indebted to you, Emily, for all the expertise you have brought to our community for nearly two decades. We wish you the best in your future endeavors.
