

New Home Committee Eyes Opportunity

In 2021, our 75th anniversary, the GFO established a fund to purchase a permanent home. The announced target date to purchase and move into our own building was late spring, 2026. This date was chosen because we have a short window every five years to renew our existing lease.

We are still two years short of that target date. Nevertheless, over the past year, a few members have watched the real estate listings for affordable properties that would meet our needs. The problem with buying a property "early" is that our lease obligation would overlap expenses for utilities and maintenance. But we wanted to keep our eyes open for an exceptional opportunity, one that was so good, it would make up for many months of redundant expenses.

In the last couple of months, there has been a tangible slump in the commercial real estate market. Suddenly, we are seeing buildings the size we need



become affordable. We have even toured a few hot prospects.

The New Home Committee could use more volunteers. Our greatest needs are continuing the New Home Campaign, selecting a building, identifying needed renovations, researching permits, and

working with architects.

Occasionally, a member sends in a suggestion for a building to look into. We regularly monitor LoopNet, but many properties never get listed there. If you come across a plausible property, feel free to email us with its address, what you like about it, and ideally, a photo of its "For Sale" sign.

The GFO's annual Open House took place March 16-24, 2024. We enjoyed 21 online presentations, attracting more than 1,100 attendees.

Like last year, we staffed the library every day with research assistants to conduct tours, help beginners, and answer questions from the handful of passers-by who noticed our sign on the sidewalk. We also experimented with some new initiatives:


- We held two hybrid classes, with our speaker in the library.
- We set up a Zoom viewing room in the library.
- We organized the lineage society panel presentation.

Open House is always invigorating, as attendees are sparked by new resources and approaches. We had more than two dozen presenters who freely contributed their time to create and present informative sessions.

At the end of every presentation, we asked attendees to answer a brief optional survey. We did not provide any multiple-choice options because open-ended questions are more insightful, although typically more difficult to quantify.

The most interesting set of responses was to the question: "What could be improved in this presentation?" We received 364 responses, with 370 quantifiable suggestions. (Some answers had more than one suggestion.) Suggestions that came up five times or more are summarized here:

- Most attendees (238) offered no suggestions for improvement.
- The most prominent suggestion (40) was to provide a handout.



• The next most prominent suggestion dealt with the length of the presentations. Twenty-nine participants felt the presentation should have been longer; six suggested reducing the scope and adding a follow-on class; and five said that too much information was presented.

- Sixteen participants wished for a recording.
- Finally, nine participants found the on-screen examples to be hard to follow (generally too small on the screen), and seven wanted more examples.

Even the most critical survey question reveals that Open House participants want more of the same!

We will share survey results with each presenter. In the meantime, please join us in thanking the many volunteers who organized and conducted the event, including our wonderful speakers who invested many hours to make Open House a success.

Records, Not Revenue Announces Improvements to the U.S. CIS Genealogy Program

A new fee schedule for certain immigration records held by the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Service began on 1 April 2024. The **USCIS Genealogy Program** manages historical immigration documents. The program provides two services, an "Index Search" and a "Records Request." Previously, the cost of either of these services was \$65.00. The new fee is \$30.00.

The records held by the USCIS are

- Form AR-2 (Alien Registrations Forms)
- C-Files (Naturalization Certificate Files)
- Visa Files
- Registry Files
- A-Files (Alien Files)

The reason that these documents are of interest to genealogists and family historians is that any

immigrant who arrived on or after 1 July 1924 should be found in one of these record sets. Additionally, people who naturalized after September 1906, had contact with the INS after April 1944, or who were registered as an alien in 1940 would have records.

An additional improvement to the program is that if an index search finds forms that have already been digitized, those forms will be provided without any additional fee. Only AR-2s and C-Files have been digitized so far.

NGS Membership Adds Member Benefit

Access to NewspaperArchive an Additional Feature for All Members

The National Genealogical Society recently announced that members will now have access to NewspaperArchive. **NewspaperArchive** is a database of more than 280+ million pages of digitized newspapers. The publications start as early as 1736 and include content from all 50 states. The National Genealogical Society website states that NewspaperArchive is adding one to two million pages of new content monthly.

The NewspaperArchive website search function is similar to other newspaper sites, such as Newspapers.com and Historic Oregon Newspapers, with

both a simple and advanced search feature.

Membership in the National Generalogical Society is \$85.00 for one year for an individual, \$105.00 for a family, with discounts for multiple year memberships. NGS **members** can access NewspaperArchive from their website.

ConferenceKeeper is now part of NGS

ConferenceKeeper has joined with the National Genealogical Society. ConferenceKeeper is a free website and database with searchable genealogical educational offerings in the United States, the United Kingdom, Ireland, Australia, and Israel. The site has listings for conferences, individual webinars, and even travel, tours, and cruises.

Many, many of the listed offerings are free and virtual. You can also explore the site for additional subjects such as awards, contests, jobs, podcasts,


