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Oregon Counties and Their Records

This issue highlights seven counties in The Forum Insider's year-long series: Gilliam, Morrow, Umatilla, Wallowa, Hood River, Wasco, and Sherman.

The Genealogical Records of Gilliam, Morrow, Umatilla, and Wallowa Counties

Geri Auerbach, AG®

Gilliam County was created from Wasco County on 25 February 1885, and in 1899, Wheeler County was formed from Gilliam County. The county was named for Colonel Cornelius Gilliam, a commander of the Oregon volunteers.¹ Gilliam County is 1,204 square miles, which makes it the thirteenth smallest county in Oregon.² As of the 2020 U.S. federal census, Gilliam County had a population of 1,995, making it the state's third least populous county.³


pleasantly surprised to encounter newly hired Caleb!

Fresh-as-a-daisy Caleb jumped at the chance to go on the hunt through the musty old 1894 files in the basement of City Hall! The original and rare document Caleb found for me held a treasure trove of information that catapulted me into the next 12 years of finding my Irish roots and, best of all, Irish cousins lost to our family for 140 years. What Caleb told me later when I sought other records was that Ellen's death record was among just a few years of records that had been spared the purge of old records after they had been transcribed in the 1950s. Whew!

I sent Caleb a "thank you" card, enclosing a Starbucks gift card as a sign of my deep appreciation for his help. And so began my awareness of the importance of taking time to thank folks for their help. I often hear back how it "made their day" to be acknowledged for their service. Now, I send e-cards of thanks, attaching a gift card (being sure to email the helper ahead of time to be sure to check their spam file for the e-card.) Also, be forewarned this practice of showing appreciation backfired in the upper Mid-West when I thanked the archivist at the University of Wisconsin with a card—no Starbucks for miles! I got smart...I use my investigative skills to find a good coffee shop nearest them. Imagine their surprise when they went into their favorite shop to find their treat had already been paid for! (Local genealogist Susan Baird sends a fresh rose in a vial of water in a mailing tube to helpers.)

So, you can see it's a lot of fun – making folks smile and feeling appreciated in their efforts to help you learn more about your family history. In receiving/remembering your thanks, volunteer and paid staff in all these repositories will not only feel appreciated, but they'll be also more likely to help other family researchers in the future. It's important to recognize the human dimension in the work we do, with a spirit of gratitude.

The Genealogical Records of Gilliam, Morrow, Umatilla, and Wallowa Counties, from page 1

Morrow County was created from Umatilla and Wasco Counties in 1885. It was named for Jackson Lee Morrow, a member of the Legislative Assembly and an early settler.⁴ Morrow County is 2,033 square miles—seventeenth largest county in Oregon.⁵ As of the 2020 U.S. federal census, Morrow County had a population of 12,300, making it the state's eighth least populous county.⁶

Umatilla County was one of the 17 counties carved out of the original Wasco County. The county was created on 27 September 1862. Various boundary changes occurred with the creation of Grant, Morrow, Union, and Wallowa counties.⁷ The county was named for the Umatilla River.⁸ Umatilla County is 3,215 square miles, the state's eighth largest county.⁹ As of the 2020 U.S. federal census, Umatilla County had a population of 80,075, making it Oregon's fourteenth most populous county.¹⁰

Wallowa County was created out of Union County on 11 February 1887. Three subsequent boundary changes occurred in 1890, 1900, and 1915.¹¹ The county is named for Wallowa Lake and the Wallowa River.¹² Wallowa County is Oregon's ninth largest county at 3,145 square miles.¹³ It is the fifth least populated county in the state with 7,391 people, according to the 2020 U.S. Federal Census.¹⁴

Libraries

City of Pendleton Library—The library has inlibrary access to Ancestry.com. It houses the collection of the Blue Mountain Genealogical Society. The library also has Umatilla County newspapers on microfilm.

Their collection (housed at the City of Pendleton library) includes local histories, city directories, obituaries, Donation Land Claim records, cemetery, and Catholic Church records of the Pacific Northwest.


Museum and Historical Societies

9 Gilliam County Historical Society and Museum—The museum has yearbooks for most years of Condon High School and some Arlington High years. Other records include a card file with obituary notices, photos (buildings and people), the Condon newspaper (1901–1907 and 1914–present), a few Arlington newspapers, oral histories from various ethnic communities (German [settled in Clem], Finn [settled in Mikkalo], and Irish and Scottish histories). The museum also has a Gilliam County census for 1901 and a 2014 book listing local cemeteries.

10 Morrow County Historical Society and Museum—The museum has a large photograph collection of the development of Morrow County as well as hundreds of family files. The museum will also do newspaper lookups for Heppner, Lexington, Ione, and other local towns. The society published the Morrow County Chronicles from 1983–2017, and issues are available for purchase.

11 Umatilla County Historical Society and Heritage Station Museum—The society

publishes the quarterly journal *Pioneer Trails,* which focuses on the people, places, and events in Umatilla County.

12 Wallowa County Museum–The museum has

a collection of approximately 20,000 digitized records.

13 Wallowa History Center–The center has a research library as well as an online collection of resources. The museum's online Research Resources collection includes a collection of digitized newspapers from Wallowa County.

The Genealogical Records of Hood River, Wasco, and Sherman Counties

Geri Auerbach, AG®

Hood River County was created by the passage of a statewide initiative and was made official by the governor on 23 June 1908. Hood River's parent county was Wasco County, and the county was named for both the Hood River and Mt. Hood.¹ Hood River county is 522 square miles, which makes it the second smallest county in Oregon.² As of the 2020 U.S. federal census, Hood River County had a population of 23,977, making it the state's twenty-sixth most populous county.³

Wasco County was created on 11 January 1854. The county was named for the Wasco (Wascopam) tribe that lived in the area. Wasco County was initially the largest county ever formed in the United States. Seventeen counties in present-day Eastern Oregon were created from Wasco County.⁴ Today it is the twenty-third largest county in Oregon at 2,387 square miles.⁵ Wasco County had 26,670 residents as of the 2020 U.S. federal census, making it the state's twenty-second most populous county.⁶

Sherman County is one of the 17 counties created out of the original Wasco County. It was created in 1889. Sherman County is named for General William Tecumseh Sherman.⁷ The county is 823 square miles and is the eighth smallest county in Oregon.⁸ Sherman County is Oregon's second least populated county with a population of 1,870 on the 2020 U.S. federal census.⁹

Libraries

5 Hood River Library-History and Genealogy-The library has access to local historical newspapers, yearbooks, Polk City Directories for The Dalles/Hood River, and internment records for several local cemeteries.

6 Wasco County Library-Local History and Genealogy—The library has a genealogy collection including a card catalog for local family names, early settler information, and cemetery indexes. Early newspapers, early wills, and vital records indexes are available on microfilm.

Archival/Government-held Records

7 Hood River County Records Inventory, Wasco County Records Inventory, and Sherman

County Records Inventory—List of and links to the variety of records for these counties including vital records, property, court, name change, and naturalization. Location of records is provided.

Genealogical Societies

8 Columbia Gorge Genealogical Society—The society serves the Oregon counties of Wasco, Hood River, and Sherman, and the Washington counties of Klickitat and Skamania. The society has various publications for purchase, as well as their newsletter *Tales and Trails.* The society meets at the Columbia Gorge Discovery Center.

Museums

9 Columbia Gorge Discovery Center—At the center is the William G. Dick Research Library which houses a vertical file of over 8,300 topics. The library has newspapers from Wasco County back to the 1880s, school records, city directories, phone books, obituaries, and more than 2,000 books about the history, geography, and genealogy of the area. It also has collections from local writers and historians. The center also houses the records of the Wasco County Pioneer Association.

Wasco County Pioneer Association (no website)—The association has various records such as meeting minutes, biographies, picture boards, and photos held at the Columbia Gorge Discovery Center. Association photos are online hosted by Oregon State University at Oregon Digital. Use the search term "WCPA" to see the collection.

Cascade Locks Historical Museum–The museum has an online collection catalog that includes yearbooks, some documents, postcards,

History Museum of Hood River County—The museum has a collection including documents and photographs of the history of the Hood River

Multnomah County Marriage Records at the GFO Now Fully Indexed

The GFO holds nearly all of the original Multhomah County marriage record books, which date back to 1855. Indexing these marriage records has been a long-term goal for our organization.

On GivingTuesday, in November 2021, 75 people joined in our first-ever virtual indexing event to kickstart the indexing of unindexed volumes. On that day, 1,870 marriages were indexed. The work continued through the dedication of Loretta Welsh and other volunteers. The project is finally completed, and the index for all 83,864 marriages is now available. You can find the index on our website at **GFO:Multnomah County Marriages**.

GFO members may request images using free GFO Library Lookups in **MemberSpace**.

Non-members may order copies on the web site at the **Multnomah County Marriages** page. Digital images (color) will be emailed for \$5 per record. Printed hard copies (black & white) are \$7 per record.

The 2023 Seal is the latest recognition from the program. GFO has earned a gold level recognition every year since an upgrade from silver in 2019.



Tanya answered a call for volunteers during the 2022 Open House. Since April 2022, she has been a



NGS Family History Conference to be Virtual in 2024

After a pandemic pause in 2020 and 2021, The National Genealogical Society's annual Family History Conference was in person (and virtual) in 2022 in Sacramento, California, and in 2023 in Richmond, Virginia. In late June, the **National Genealogical Society** (NGS) notified members that the 2024 Family History Conference will be entirely virtual. In their email to members they noted:

> ...the meetings and events industry has not recovered from the pandemic. Challenges remain for event planners from labor shortages at facilities to attendance declines across the events industry. We must address these issues by reimagining our conference to merge the highest educational standards,

exceptional in-person experiences, and technologically advanced learning opportunities while being financially sound.

The NGS will gather a group of genealogy leaders (instructors, organizations, company leaders, and members) "to start a conversation about the future of genealogy events."
